As banking moves increasingly online financial institutions need to be aware of how to properly contract in an electronic manner. Between the Federal E-Sign Act and Louisiana's version of the "Uniform" Electronic Transactions Acts, institutions need to be careful to observe the legal requirements in order for their electronic contracts to be deemed valid and enforceable. This presentation will walk through the electronic contracting requirements and highlight how the failure to observe these requirements can impact the validity of loan originations, recordkeeping obligations, and the ability to enforce security interests in collateral.
